I. Deed: James Patton & John Lewis to Robert Guin

Dated 17 July 1745 — Recorded 25 July 1745

Orange County, Virginia

Court Minute (Clerk's Endorsement)

At a court held for Orange County on Thursday March the 24th 1745,
This Indenture was acknowledged by James Patton and John Lewis & was
examined and the order thereunto annexed to be recorded.

Indenture Text

This Indenture, made this Seventeenth Day of July in the year of our Lord
one thousand seven hundred and forty five, **Between James Patton and John
Lewis**, both of Augusta County, of the one part, and **Robert Guin** of the same
County of the other part.

Witnesseth that for and in consideration of the sum of **five shillings current
money of Virginia** to the said James Patton and John Lewis in hand paid by
the said Robert Guin at or before the sealing and delivery of these presents,
the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, they the said James Patton and
John Lewis **have granted, bargained, sold, aliened, released and confirmed**, and
by these presents **do grant, bargain, sell, alien, release and confirm** unto the said
Robert Guin, his heirs and assigns forever, **a certain tract or parcel of land
containing by estimation twelve hundred acres**, be the same more or less, lying

and being in the County of Orange on the waters of the **North Fork of the Rivanna River**, and bounded as follows, to wit:

- Beginning at two Chesnut Oaks and a Spanish Oak, corner to John Graham
- South 76° West 94 poles to a Chesnut Oak on the river side
- Down the river as it meanders 134 poles to a large Poplar
- South 75° East 124 poles to a large Pine
- South 25° East 120 poles to a large Pine
- South 75° East 120 poles to a large Pine
- North 75° East 120 poles to a large Pine
- Continuing by the several courses thereof to the beginning

Together with all **houses, buildings, orchards, ways, waters, watercourses, profits, commodities, hereditaments and appurtenances** whatsoever to the said premises belonging or in any wise appertaining, and the **reversion and reversions, remainder and remainders, rents, issues and profits** thereof.

Habendum and Warranty

To **Have and To Hold** the said tract or parcel of land and all and singular the premises, tenements, hereditaments and appurtenances thereof hereby granted or mentioned or intended to be granted unto the said Robert Guin, his heirs and assigns forever, to the only proper use and behoof of him the said Robert Guin and of his heirs and assigns forever.

And the said James Patton and **John Norris** do covenant for themselves, their heirs, executors and administrators, that **Leonard Brown deceased**, and James Patton and Robert Guin were possessed of these premises; that the said James Patton and John Norris were the true and lawful owners of the said premises and seized of a good, sure, perfect and indefeasible estate of inheritance in **fee simple** in the premises hereby granted; and that the said Robert Guin, his heirs or assigns, shall and may forever hereafter peaceably and quietly have, hold and enjoy the same without let, trouble, hindrance or molestation of them the said James Patton and John Norris or any other person or persons claiming under them.

And that the said James Patton and John Norris and their heirs and every other person or persons shall and will **warrant and forever defend** the said tract or parcel of land and premises unto the said Robert Guin, his heirs and assigns, against all persons whatsoever lawfully claiming or to claim the same or any part thereof.

II. Deed: James Patton & John Buchanan to John Lewis

Dated 10 July 1744

Augusta County, Virginia

Indenture Text

This Indenture, made this tenth Day of July in the Year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and forty four, **Between James Patton and John Buchanan**, both of Augusta County, of the one part, and **John Lewis** of the same County of the other part.

Witnesseth that for and in consideration of the sum of **five shillings current money of Virginia** to them in hand paid by the said John Lewis before the sealing and delivery of these presents, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, they the said Patton and Buchanan have **given, granted, bargained, sold and confirmed** unto the said John Lewis **one certain tract or**

parcel of land containing five hundred and four acres, lying and being in Augusta County on the **south side of the River Cowpasture**, and bounded as followeth (metes and bounds as in original).
